

Important Information About Your Drinking Water

Public water systems must routinely monitor for drinking water contaminants. ZAVALA COUNTY WCID 1, TX2540003 failed to monitor for or meet drinking water standards. The table below lists each violation, the time period(s), potential health effects, and associated analytical results (if applicable).
